

Overview

- **Mission statement:** To create and foster *practitioner excellence* to improve public health practice at the system, community, and organizational levels.
- **Geographic coverage of the Colorado Public Health Training Center (CO-PHTC):** The state of Colorado as well as the Southern Ute, Mountain Ute and the Pine Ridge Reservations.
- **CO-PHTC intended audiences:** Staff of state and local health departments, community-based organizations, foundations, health care organizations, and others working towards improving the health of the public in the areas we serve.

Key Activities

- The Colorado School of Public Health (CSPH) is a consortium school, joining the strengths of the University of Colorado Anschutz Medical Campus, Colorado State University and the University of Northern Colorado. The CSPH has approximately 200 faculty and 500 students. The CO-PHTC draws from the vast resources across the three campuses to strengthen workforce development throughout the state.
- The CO-PHTC uses a highly collaborative model to approach public health training allowing for a comprehensive system of training and project development with key partners to meet the needs of our constituents.
- Training highlights for this year include: Evidence-based Public Health, Shaping Policy for Health, Chronic Disease Management in Communities, Cultural Competency, Public Health Leadership Development, Community Health Assessment, Public Health 101, Project Management, Community Collaborations, and Using Social Media Approaches in Public Health.
- The CO-PHTC, in partnership with the Southwestern Colorado AHEC, is also developing a systematic approach to rural practicum placements utilizing the results of an assessment of current practices by PHTCs across the country.

Impact on Public Health Workforce

- The CO-PHTC provides trainings and facilitates community conversations to build collaborations between public health and health care providers in order to more effectively manage chronic diseases under health care reform.
- The CO-PHTC provides in-person and online trainings reaching those working to serve the health of the public in urban, rural, frontier and reservation settings. Trainings are tailored to meet current and emerging needs and delivered using a variety of methods, including in-person, facilitated community discussions, self-paced online learning modules, and web-based distance learning courses.
- The CO-PHTC assesses public health workforce development needs in partnership with the: 1) Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment, 2) Colorado Association of Local Public Health Officials, 3) Area Health Education Centers and 4) local public health staff serving the Ute and Pine Ridge Reservations.
- Over 20 different kinds of public health-related trainings were developed and delivered reaching over 700 participants in the first year of the CO-PHTC.
